If you can't find the creator of the YouTube video, use the screen name as the author.

Screen name. (year, month day). *Title of the video*. [Video file]. Retrieved from <http://xxxx>

If you find the creator put the screen name in brackets.

Author, A. A. [Screen name]. (year, month day). *Title of the video*. [Video file]. Retrieved from <http://xxxx>

Alphabetize entries by the author's last name. If there is no author, alphabetize by the first word.

Italicize titles of longer works such as books and journals.

Do not italicize, underline, or put quotes around titles of shorter works such as journal articles or essays in edited collections.

Names of Journals: Capitalize all major words.

Journal Article Titles: Capitalize the first word of the title and the subtitle (and proper nouns).

Book Titles: Capitalize only the first word of the title and subtitle (and proper nouns).

The reference page provides the information necessary for the reader to locate and retrieve any source you cite. Each source you cite in the paper must appear in your reference list.

Exception: Do not include references to personal communications, such as letters, emails, or interviews on the references page because they are not recoverable. Instead, cite them in-text.
