Peace Corps Retires Master's International Program After Nearly 30 Years | Apply by July 1, 2016 for Final Master's International Cohort at AUNE



In late April, the Peace Corps made the difficult decision to retire the Master's International program and focus its resources on other partnership opportunities. Established in 1987, the program pairs graduate studies with Peace Corps service. The partnership between Peace Corps Master's International and Antioch University New England had been established in May 2014. Currently, there are 15 students enrolled as

Master's International students at AUNE. The last cohort of students will start classes this fall. AUNE is dedicated to supporting these exceptional students throughout their graduate program and Peace Corps service. Prospective Master's International students need to apply to AUNE by July 1, 2016. Applicants admitted to the program must start classes on August 27, 2016, the beginning of the fall 2016 semester. 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AUNE's CTEC Awards \$3,400 in Grants for Student Projects



The AUNE Center for Tropical Ecology and Conservation (CTEC) in the Department of Environmental Studies has issued grants totaling \$3,400 to help support students in their capstone projects. Four students were awarded funds this year, supporting conservation work in the neotropics and in Africa, in biodiversity hotspots, and in tropical forests, agricultural systems, and aquatic systems. The annual event celebrates the start of hiking season and offers visitors opportunities to learn about, and gain a greater appreciation for the mountain and its natural resources. MERE ambassadors and other event partners interacted with several

hundred park visitors throughout the day. With the wonderful weather, many participants summited Mt. Monadnock and spoke with Jennifer Dickinson, a MERE summit steward. Peter Palmiotto, AUNE professor and MERE director, also led an enthusiastic group of hikers to the summit. The most popular activity was learning about the live hawks. Diane Welch, a licensed falconer with the Massachusetts Falconry and Hawk Trust, along with Rita Tulloh, a licensed falconer with the New Hampshire Falconers Association, educated visitors about birds of prey with the help of their two red-tail hawks.

Mount Monadnock has impressed and captivated people for centuries. Relatively small and easy to summit, at 3,165 feet, Monadnock is the popular hiking

destination for over 95,000 visitors each year. That tally places Mount Monadnock as the second most climbed mountain in the world, after Mount Fuji. Read more.

Dave Adkinson is President of the John A. Becker Company and has served on the AUM board for six years. During his tenure, Dave

has served as the Chair of the Institutional Advancement Committee and served on the Executive Committee. As President of the John A. Becker Company, Dave oversees all nine Becker locations with approximately 170 associates. Over the years, Dave has been a part of various non-profit boards, most notably serving 18 years on the Advisory Board of the Dayton Area Salvation Army as Treasurer. In addition, Dave's professionalism and extensive knowledge of the electrical distribution business, has led to numerous requests to serve on other industry-related advisory boards and committees with national organizations such as NAED and AD. Dave has been instrumental in the growth of the university and had a central role in facilitating two major grants from the Becker Family Fund.

A community leader, Clark has been recognized recently in Dayton with several awards including The Dayton Region Walk of Fame. He was also recently featured in a TV commercial for organ donors in the Miami Valley. Clark is the retired owner of CEBEC Associates, an educational oriented firm which he founded after retiring as Assistant Dean of the College of Engineering and Computer Science at Wright State University in 2001. Before Wright State, he was Associate Professor of Manufacturing Engineering at Central State University (1985-87); Research and Development Engineer/Manager at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base and part-time instructor at Sinclair Community College and Central State (1955-85).

"Where are the Muslim Voices?" was a discussion held by Zari Hedayat, AULA affiliate faculty, is a Muslim Iranian, Layla Jillhood, AULA affiliate faculty, is an Iraqi Muslim, Huda Bayaa is a graduate student in psychology and a Palestinian Muslim, and Lana Istwani is a Syrian Muslim. The four women joined together to speak about their daily lives as Muslim women living in America. They addressed what it is to be Muslim in a country where being Muslim is increasingly suspect.

They expressed fears of being targeted for their faith, but instead of stepping back they are compelled to step forward and entreat people to learn about the Islamic faith and to understand that their religion, like other religions, promotes peace and intellectual discourse. Huda Bayaa implored the audience to take the information they've learned to engage others in a dialog about Islam and to challenge the misinformation that permeates the understanding of Islam that is shared by others.
