AULA Professor Emerita Stephanie Glass Solomon's "Foot Soldiers for Justice" Awarded Grant



Antioch University Los Angeles (AULA) Professor Emerita Stephanie Glass Solomon received the Puffin Foundation Ltd. Grant for Photography for her work "Foot Soldiers Never Die" in 2016. Later, she created "Foot Soldiers for Justice," a video and website that address the nation's ongoing struggle for the right to vote, and against voter suppression.

Glass Solomon was inspired by the sight of a middle-aged black man in Selma, standing by an old sedan with T-shirts spread across the hood. Hoping to sell the shirts, he was holding one up. It read, "Foot Soldiers Never Die. The 50th

Anniversary. They marched for me and they didn't even know my name."

"My intent was and is to contribute as a Foot Soldier," says Glass Solomon, "and to support the movements for social justice as an Artist Activist."

Student Speaker-Jason Rhoades, PhD, Environmental Studies

Dr. Melinda Treadwell, vice president of academic affairs, asked me to talk about a life of service today. AUNE Alumna and Author Jennifer Lovett's First Book, "Beavers Away!" Published by Beaver's Pond Press



Beaver's Pond Press has published "Beavers Away!" a children's book written and illustrated by Jennifer Lovett, alumna of the Master's in Environmental Studies program of 2014. Based on a true story about Elmo Heter, a game warden for Idaho Fish and Game in the 1950s, "Beavers Away!" chronicles Heter's efforts to relocate beavers away from an area where they'd become a nuisance and into an area of Idaho where their activity would be beneficial to the habitat.

However, the plan had a major obstacle: The beavers' destination was remote and not

accessible by road.

Ultimately, Heter devised a plan to safely reintroduce beavers to the area by parachuting them from the sky. Once landed, the sky-diving beavers were able to quickly restore an eroded and barren landscape, transforming it into a lush habitat that provided food and shelter for many other types of animals.

Nearly 70 years later, the story of Elmo Heter and a beaver named Geronimo is particularly significant, highlighting the importance of innovation in restoring and conserving wetlands to mitigate the effects of climate change.
