AUNE Grads Found Micro-School



AUNE grads Michelle Simpson-Siegel (Environmental Science '98) and Jessica Turner (Experienced Educator Program '05) are co-founding a micro-school in Vermont, the Brattleboro School Without Walls (SW2). SW2 will operate as a modern one-room schoolhouse, where students of different ages learn from one another and work through the curriculum at their own pace. Class size is intentionally small, and the school meets only a few days a week.

Simpson-Siegel is the executive director of Oak Meadow, a well-known homeschool curriculum provider and distance learning school that recently became the first distance school to receive accreditation from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. Turner is a long time educator with experience teaching middle school through college age students.

Both credit their Antioch University New England experience as the foundation and inspiration for this exciting venture. "Dr. Jane Miller, my professor in the Education Department at Antioch University New England, who recently retired, inspired me to start my own school and to take on this enormous project one step at a time," said Turner. "She was completely supportive of me as a teacher and as a learner."

Credit for internships, apprenticeships, and other learning opportunities are all part of the SW2 picture as well. Turner and Simpson-Siegel strongly believe that nothing should be "extracurricular" in a student's education, so the creation of this learning center is helping turn their belief into a reality.

The Drama Therapy department provided a Drama Therapy event, titled "The Heart of the Matter". The Antioch

Committee for Social Justice and Change, a new student group, also hosted a Rally for Mental Health during the Heart of Antioch Week, which pushed for greater access to mental health services in the community, and which provided an interactive story wall in the downstairs atrium.

Antioch University Seattle's New Building Construction Featured on KING5 News



KING5 News recently reported on Antioch University Seattle's (AUS) upcoming move from the Denny Triangle to the Belltown neighborhood, four blocks away. This news coverage includes both a television news video, also available online, and a written news article.



The video includes footage of the new AUS building as construction takes place! The new AUS Belltown building is already starting to look like the architectural illustrations available through the AUS main website.

The article reports on that after selling its current building, AUS is investing in its new home, which will include cutting-edge technology, the creation of a new bachelor's degree program focused on health psychology and counseling, and an upcoming dance therapy program.

KING5 also reports that the new AUS building will stand out by standing only three stories tall, in an area full of skyscrapers. AUS President Dan Hocoy was quoted as saying "We didn't want to be a 42-story building. We like the idea of being close to the ground...This is a brand new build that will only be three stories high, which is quite remarkable for downtown Seattle."

Ms. Coco Decorated for Memorial Day



The mirrored pig statue at the front doors of Antioch University Seattle--known as Ms. Coco--had a Memorial Day tribute. This tribute was visible the week before Memorial Day, as campus was closed on the Memorial Day holiday itself.

A bouquet of red roses lay on the ground, along with a standing United States flag, and a framed copy of the 1915 John McCrae poem <u>In Flanders Fields</u>. The text of the poem is as follows:

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky, The larks, still bravely singing, fly, Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead; short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe!
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high!
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.
