A Message from the Chancellor, Bill Groves



Across Antioch University we all share the same message - increase enrollments and provide quality student services. As I travel around and speak with many of you, I am frequently asked 'We know we need to increase enrollments, but how are we going to do that? What's the plan?' This past week a major step has been

taken to build the vision and create the plan for Antioch University's viability going forward.

Our newly constituted Provosts' Council, under the leadership of Iris Weisman, Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs and University Provost, met for two intense days (August 11-12) to craft the University's Academic Strategic and Enrollment Management Plan. A link to the final plan will be published in a future edition of Common Thread.

The Provosts agreed to a three-phase, two-year plan that takes our educational commitment of "jobs and justice" to a new level and focuses on three tiers of activity: short term activities that invest in the expansion of quality campus programs and engages in some scaling of programs across campuses; mid-term growth by scaling some of our best programs between and across campuses nationally; and finally, the longer-term growth in new degrees and programs.

The short term, immediate activities focus on less than a dozen activities that the Provosts, in consultation with MB Lufkin, Vice Chancellor of Marketing and Enrollment Management, feel can increase enrollments in the next several months. The mid-range and long-range activities will be determined in consultation with the University Academic Council and input from university faculty. Marketing analysis, resource allocations, institutional strength and capacity, as well as return on investment in terms of growth and mission-amplification will all be taken into account. A University Fund for the Future to invest in programming is being established to help support these efforts.

Perhaps most significantly, the Provosts' Council worked collaboratively for the good of the entire University. Each member of this group was able to bring their best thinking to the health and wellness of their campus community within the context of the larger institution. I want to thank each member of the group – Ben Pryor, Bill Flores, Dale Johnston, Melinda Treadwell, Marian Glancy, Laurien Alexandre, and Iris Weisman for their terrific work. We are indebted to your efforts and look forward to seeing the fruits of your labor over these next months. I am also appreciative of the wonderful ideas submitted by faculty across the University, which have been taken under consideration by the Provosts' Council.

We have a lot of work ahead and there are many challenges no doubt, but I am more confident each day with this dedicated team in place. Thank you to all who are involved in this significant and mission-critical effort.

Antioch University Los Angeles 2016 Alumni Award Recipients Announced



The recipients of this year's Antioch University Los Angeles (AULA) Alumni Awards will be honored at an October 16 luncheon at the California Yacht Club in Marina del Rey.

"Each of our honorees demonstrates an exceptional dedication to the University's ideals and mission," said AULA Interim Provost Dale A. Johnston Ph.D. "They have had a deep and lasting impact on the communities where they live and work. We are all honored to recognize these alumni for their incredible contributions and the inspiration they have been to others."

Shari Foos, a marriage and family therapist, educator and activist, will be the first recipient of the university's Lifetime Achievement Award. In 1999, she and David Tripp co-founded Antioch's Bridge Program, which offers free college courses in the humanities to low-income adult learners. Foos, who earned both a BA in Liberal Studies and an MA in

Clinical Psychology from AULA, is also the creator of The Narrative Method, a dynamic group experience that uses stories and big ideas to transform relationships. The Narrative Method provides free workshops to veterans as well as young adults, women's shelters, and others dealing with PTSD, homelessness and other issues.

Steven Reigns will receive the 2016 Distinguished Alumni Award. A poet, educator and therapist, he was named the first City Poet of West Hollywood on October 2014. He has published two poetry collections and a dozen chapbooks, and edited "My Life is Poetry," featuring his students in the first-ever autobiographical poetry workshop for LGBT seniors. Reigns has taught writing workshops around the country to LGBT youth and people living with HIV. A nine-time recipient of the City of Los Angeles' Department of Cultural Affairs Artist in Residency Grant program, he earned an MA in Clinical Psychology from Antioch in 2010.

Dr. Ashaki Jackson is the recipient of the 2016 AULA Alumni Association Award for Exemplary Community Service and Activism. She is a social psychologist and program evaluator whose work focuses on youth moving through the juvenile justice system. As a consultant, she has worked on federal and state-sponsored studies of vulnerable populations. A 2006 graduate of AULA's MFA in Creative Writing program, Jackson has volunteered as a writing instructor and youth mentor for many youth programs, including WriteGirl's In Schools program for teen girls and InsideOut Writers for incarcerated and post-release youth and young adults. She co-founded a women's writing group, Women Who Submit, devoted to increasing women's' presence in top tier literary journals.

Wally Hanley, recipient of the 2016 AULA Alumni Association Award for Outstanding Service to the University, has two degrees from AULA—a BA in Liberal Arts (1996) and an MA in Organizational Management (1998). As a program manager for Habitat for Humanity Los Angeles, he ran the partnership homebuilding operations in South Central LA, which delivered over 100 single—and multiple–family residences for people to buy and own. From there, he became a full-time instructor at LA Trade Tech College (LATTC), where he now serves as Academic Senate President and co-chair of the College Council. Over the past year, Hanley led the development of an important new partnership between AULA and LA Trade Tech. As a result of this joint venture, AULA is now offering a degree completion program on–site at LATTC.

Stuart said, "I will be participating in the poster session, the second day of the conference. My poster is about how AU librarians and faculty collaborate with students so that students' dissertations can be published in open access databases. Open access means they are freely available to the public. This puts our scholarship out in the world and makes it easily accessible to other scholars/researchers."

Read & Write, a software program that integrates reading, writing, studying and research support tools for PC and Mac users, is now available free of charge to everyone at Antioch. This program features an easy to use toolbar that provides tools for Text-to-Speech, Organizing & Outlining, Brainstorming, Speech-to-Text, and much more.

Originally developed as a literacy tool for students with disabilities, all students, staff, and faculty will find this tool useful when planning their writing, creating sound files from digital text, or gathering resources during research. In this context, Read&Write serves as both an accessibility tool and a productivity booster.

AUM Seeds of Change Program Provides Tangible Help



For seven years, students in AUM's Grant Writing course have had a student philanthropy component incorporated into the class. Called Seeds of Change, the program has granted over \$20,000 to local non-profits since its inception.

As part of the class, students oversee the entire process of soliciting grant proposals from local non-profits including: determining the guidelines, issuing

the RFP, scoring the applications, and engaging the organizations who receive the funds.

"We sincerely appreciate the England Family who has generously endowed funds in their daughter, Elaine England's name to ensure students have this opportunity regardless of state or federal funds. Elaine was a student in the first class who participated in the project, discovered a love for philanthropic work, and was planning to seek this as a career path upon graduation," said Karin VanZant, who teaches the course.

This semester's class awarded two grants. One went to the Kirkmont Center, a camp and retreat center serving public and private school groups, non-profit organizations, youth groups, sports teams, music and art associations, churches and faith based groups of all denominations, families, businesses, and individuals; whose goal is to provide a renewing camp, outdoor education, or retreat experience. The second award was given to Girl Power which helps city middle school girls at four sites build health, self-esteem, and great relationships.

Antioch University Midwest's Dr. Guy Burneko Releases "New Reflections on things at Hand: Contemplating EcoHuman Sustainability"



Along with Thomas Berry, Guy Burneko, former Antioch University Seattle and current Antioch University Midwest adjunct faculty member and Director of the Institute for Contemporary Ancient Learning, has released his new book, New Reflections on things at Hand: Contemplating EcoHuman Sustainability. The themes of his new book are also related to teaching and interests including hermeneutic ontology, field/connectivity theory, analytical psychology, ecology

and religion, social justice and theory of self-organizing systems.

The book is titled in the spirit of the NeoConfucian Zhu Xi's 12th century classic, Reflections on Things at Hand. It posits that there may be other kinds of ego-ing, or of non-egoing, that support the extreme long-term sustainability and coevolution of ecohuman or Earth-human systems better than our now dominant anthropo-and ego-centrism. The book describes how the practice of attentive ecosocial mindfulness as an alternative to ego-as-we-know-it can take us beyond ideas of sustainability as simply a means of long-term extraction of reward and toward living as generative and regenerative performances of the self-rewarding patterns of the life of the universe.

A prime theme of this book is that in the ecosocial mindfulness of full attention to experience regardless of its potential benefits, we are more likely to find the extreme-long-term wellbeing of sustaining Earth-human relations and experiencing ourselves as what Berry calls "a dimensionality" of cosmogenesis.

Dr. Burneko is a teacher, writer, and thinker especially interested in transdisciplinary intercultural interpretation and what he calls the Planetary Noetic Repertoire of nondual or nonreductive insights, as these seem sustaining and meaningful for future consciousness and suited for sustainable natural and ecohumane systems.
