Mission Statement

Community Garden Connections (CGC) serves to build our local capacity to grow food and enhance personal and communal wellbeing among those most impacted and disenfranchised by climate change, Covid-19, and other social, economic, and ecological injustices. CGC offers safe places for community members to get outside, learn, and connect through gardening. It addresses food insecurity related to climate change, personal and communal health, and resiliency. With the help of a private donation from the Rashti Foundation, CGC supports the installation and cooperative maintenance of 70+ raised gardens in partnership with local service agencies, students, and community members. These funds also support educational outreach to meet the specific gardening interests of community partners.





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Why CGC?

Community gardens provide access to healthy landscapes, enhance our connections to outdoor environments, create strong social networks, increase self-sufficiency and local food security, and increase wellness. Gardening provides an affordable, nutritious food source. It cuts across social, economic, and racial barriers to bring together people of all ages and backgrounds.

C&S Workplace Organic Gardens

At C&S Wholesale Grocers in Keene, organic workplace gardens provide a way for employees and their families to grow produce for themselves and for direct donations to local hunger relief organizations. C&S and Antioch University New England have been partners since 2011, and this year, worked hard to provide garden resources and educational opportunities while keeping safety a top priority. The garden educator provided 12 newsletters, spent 3 hours per week on-site for "garden hours," met monthly with the North and South Hatfield, MA sites for virtual garden chats, and created a garden program binder to facilitate site coordinator onboarding and continued garden program success.

At the end of the 2021 season, program evaluation highlighted multiple perceived benefits by program participants, including:

33% An increase in overall happiness

75% An improvement in overall mental health

66% An increased or improved sense of fulfillment, purpose, and physical health

58% An increase in overall work productivity

Participants in the C&S Workplace Organic Gardens Project report strong emotional connection to the gardens, including pride, happiness, joy, and relaxation. One participant remarked "it is so fulfilling to garden, grow flowers and have them in the office in vases." Another said that gardening at work helps them "connect with the earth." Additionally, garden participants care about the ways the garden project can positively impact the larger community. Ninety-two per cent (92%) of survey respondents said it was important to them that the gardens improve the environment, 83% that the gardens donate food to the community, and 75% that the gardens address food insecurity in the community.

LOOKING AHEAD

We are incredibly excited to be in the midst of planning our 10-year anniversary event series. GCC's 10th year celebration was intended for 2021, but it was postponed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. We dubbed this year's celebration series CGC's 10 +1 "Diggin' in since 2011"! This will be a series of events involving alumni, community partners, and the general public. Events include the following: in-person, hands-on workshops, virtual workshops and speakers, and both in-person festivities, garden stories and more.
